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### Fourth Student Assembly To Be Sworn Into ERC

According to plans now being made by the Office of War Coordination, a fourth group of men will be sworn into the Army Enlisted Reserve Corps in Dec. 7, 8, and 9.

Enlistments into the unassigned Reserve ranks will close December 1 but all other plans, other the Navy, Army or Marines will remain open.

The Navy's Flight Selection Board also announced that it will continue to defer V-5 Naval Aviation Cadets from active duty until they have completed the academic year in which they are enlisted.

"This means that any college man who joins V-5 will stay in school until he has finished his current academic year," said J. Comar, E. S. Brewer, USNR, senior member of the Flight Board.

"Any V-5 Cadet who receives five duty orders during his academic year should telegraph us immediately, giving me the details briefly. Such orders are made by error and will be cancelled."

### New Physics Department Appointments

#### Lab Technician, Instructor, Added

Two new instructors have been appointed to the department of Physics in the College of Liberal Arts, Dean William C. White, director of the Day Colleges, announced yesterday.

Miss Joan Motley of Concord has been added to Dr. Muckenhoupt's staff as laboratory technician in connection with radio courses offered under the Engineering, Science, and Management War Training program. She is the third woman instructor to join the Northeastern faculty. Miss Sullivan of the Biology department having been the first, and Mrs. Chipman of the English department the second.

Miss Motley, who is a graduate of the Garrison Forest School, Garrison, Maryland, and who attended Bryn Mawr College for two and one-half years, will give her time entirely to the department equipment and to assisting in connection with war training courses.

The second appointment to be made was that of George William Hankinson. Mr. Hankinson, who was granted a war degree from Northeastern in October, 1942, studied in the department of Civil Engineering. He is returning to Northeastern after serving a brief period in the Canadian army from which he received an honorable discharge.

Mr. Hankinson is a graduate of the Weymouth High School of Nova Scotia. While an undergraduate at Northeastern, he was active in the Civil Engineering Society. He will assume the teaching assignments formerly carried by Mr. Francis Nitche, recently resigned to accept a research position with the Polaroid Corporation.

Formerly an assistant instructor at MIT, Professor Strahan came to Northeastern as an instructor in Chemistry and was subsequently promoted to a professorship and made Chairman of the Department of Chemistry. He relinquished his administrative duties in 1938 because of ill health, but continued to teach the courses in Organic Chemistry. Professor Strahan was born May 11, 1881, and spent his early life in Everett and Chelsea, being graduated from the
