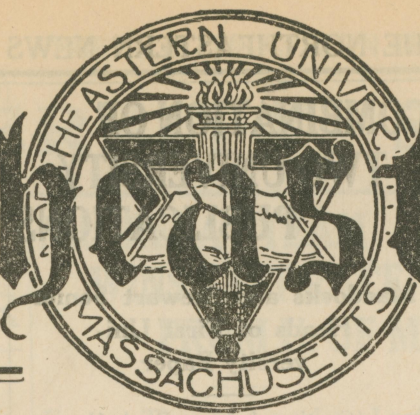

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SPECIAL TALK AT COMBINED MASS MEETING

Business Administration And
Engineering Schools Hear
James Williams

BAND PROVIDES MUSIC

At the Mass Meeting last Wednesday, James Williams, former editor of the Boston Transcript and at present editor of the Boston Evening American, spoke on "The Cultivation of American Character". Dean Garner of the Business Administration School introduced the speaker and read notices of both schools.

The mass meeting was opened by the students singing "The Star Spangled Banner," and the band following with "The Stars and Stripes Forever". Mr. Williams congratulated the band and the school on the opening of the meeting. The speaker stated that it were as foolish to compare the greatness of Washington and Lincoln as it were to compare the greatness of the Grand Canyon and Niagara Falls. He regretted the tendency of some individuals to emphasize the lineage of Washington rather than the man himself. "Study the legacy rather than the lineage of George Washington."

"One reason why you are here," he said, "is to prepare yourselves for the challenges of your day and generation and to meet them standing. If Washington had felt as had his ancestors he would not have worked. But he wouldn't flinch, he went out to work for his living as a surveyor. A noted speaker over the radio has said that Washington was not necessarily the first American. What is it to be an American, if it is not to have faith in your country and confidence in your fellow men. Washington had that faith, and we believe that he was and is the first American, and that he deserves the high place that has been given to him."

Mr. Williams stated that his speech was based on one of Washington's letters which he proceeded to read. In this letter Washington wrote to Patrick Henry: "My object is, and my object has been to make America free of political connections with Europe and to make Eu-

N.U. WRESTLERS DOWN NORWICH IN CLOSE MATCH

Overtime Bouts Necessary To
Decide Winner In Three
Classes

MINER WINS IN 3 MIN.

Showing a fighting determination unparalleled in the history of Northeastern sports the N. U. wrestling team defeated the Norwich matmen by a 19-6 score in their mat contest held Saturday afternoon. The wearers of the Red and Black were forced to their utmost to take the decision from the "Vermonters," but their superior wrestling, plus their fighting spirit was sufficient to clinch the victory.

Mowatt, our one hundred and fifteen pound star, started the home team off on the right foot by beating Walker, the Norwich man. The match was closely contested but Mowatt's superiority was vivid throughout and the N.U. man well deserved the referee's decision.

The second match on the schedule between Bosworth of N.U. and Pierce of Norwich proved to be a very closely contested affair which required two overtime periods before the referee gave the Northeastern man a well earned decision. Bosworth made a very fine showing, displaying the true Northeastern fighting spirit, sticking to the end.

Evans of Norwich defeated Day of N. U. in a very closely contested match in the one hundred and thirty-five pound class. The Northeastern man displayed some fine wrestling but the experience of the visitor told in the long run and he won the referee's decision, gaining three points for his team.

Sanborn put his team into the winning column again by gaining the first fall of the match, throwing Ring in six minutes. The match was fast, both men attempting to get the jump on his opponent, Sanborn finally getting his man where he wanted him and pinning his shoulders to the mat.
